# Connecticut Book Awards Celebrate 10 Years of Connecticut's Notable Authors and Illustrators

Hartford, Connecticut (October 11, 2011) — The Connecticut Book Awards, a program of Hartford Public Library's Connecticut Center for the Book, will celebrate ten years of honoring Connecticut's notable authors and illustrators on Sunday, October 30, 2011, at 2:00 p.m. at the Downtown Library, 500 Main Street. The Awards program is free and open to the public. A reception will follow from 3:30-5:30 p.m. with book signings by finalists and winners; tickets are \$50 per person and may be purchased at <a href="http://ctbookawards.eventbrite.com">http://ctbookawards.eventbrite.com</a>.

The Connecticut Book Awards recognizes and honors Connecticut's stellar literary community: the author, illustrator, or designer must be native-born or have been a legal resident of Connecticut for at least three years, or the book must have a Connecticut setting in order to be considered.

Best-selling author Wally Lamb, who will deliver this year's keynote, said, "Hooray for the CT Book Awards! They validate the efforts of our state's best contemporary writers and alert readers to the pleasures found between the covers of their books. In a state that is rich in literary history, the annual awards celebrate and insure the continuity of that tradition."

Former Coordinator of the Connecticut Center for the Book, Kat Lyons, one of this year's Lifetime Achievement Award recipients, said, "I am elated that a Hartford Public Library customer of almost 60 years- and a product of Hartford public schools—will be receiving this prestigious award, even if I'm personally humbled by the decision." Veteran journalist, author, writing mentor and last year's Lifetime Achievement recipient, Lary Bloom, will present the 2011 award for Lifetime Achievement in Service to the Literary Community to Ms. Lyons, as well as to the Founder & President of RJ Julia Independent Booksellers, Roxanne J. Cody.

Roxanne Cody said, "Books change lives, in big ways and small. Reading is a way to live more lives, to experience more worlds, to meet people we care about and want to know more about, to understand others, and develop a compassion for what they confront and endure. I applaud the Connecticut Center for the Book for celebrating the best of Connecticut's authors, and for

supporting those of us who are dedicated to reaching humanity through the written word. I'm honored to receive one of this year's Lifetime Achievement awards."
