## **Exhibit Celebrates Radio Icon Bob Steele at Hartford Public Library**

Hartford, Connecticut (November 28, 2011) — Hartford Public Library and its Hartford History Center will present a special exhibition on the life of Radio Hall of Fame broadcaster Bob Steele, the voice of WTIC for half a century. The opening reception will be held on Thursday, December 8 from 5:30 – 7:30 p.m. in the Café space at the Downtown Library, 500 Main Street. The exhibition will run through December 22, 2011.

Join the Library in celebrating the life of this local personality. By the time of his retirement from daily radio in 1991, Bob Steele (1911 - 2010) had created one of the longest running radio shows in the country. Materials on exhibit are on loan from his personal collection and include letters, cartoons he loved to draw and photographs.

Welcoming remarks will begin at 6:00 p.m. at the December 8<sup>th</sup> evening reception and will feature the popular radio personality Brad Davis as the keynote speaker. "I would not be broadcaster today if it wasn't for Bob Steele's mentoring," said Davis.

"Bob Steele was the voice of Hartford," said chief executive officer at Hartford Public Library Matthew K. Poland. "We are delighted to host an exhibit celebrating the life of a broadcast icon who was part of our daily lives for most of the 20<sup>th</sup> century."

The opening reception and exhibition are free and open to the public. Parking is available on the Arch Street parking deck adjacent to the library.
