Literary Community Celebrates 10th Annual Connecticut Book Awards

Hartford, Connecticut (November 29, 2011) — Winners of the 2011 Connecticut Book Awards were announced at a ceremony at Hartford Public Library on Sunday, November 20th. An enthusiastic audience paid tribute to the state's authors and illustrators in an award ceremony presented by the Connecticut Center for the Book, a program of Hartford Public Library and an affiliate of the Center for the Book in the Library of Congress.

Guests were welcomed by Chief Public Services Officer, Marian Amodeo and Chief Executive Officer, Matthew K. Poland. Wally Lamb, best-selling author and former Connecticut Book Awards Lifetime Achievement winner, was the keynote speaker. Chancellor Emeritus of the Connecticut State University System, William Cibes paid tribute to the late Connecticut Poet Laureate, Leo Connellan, whose collection of poems was published this year.

Eighteen judges, distinguished in the fields of writing, librarianship, book arts, academia, journalism and publishing, considered nominations for work published in 2011. The winners, current or former state residents or authors whose work had a Connecticut setting, were chosen in six categories.

Additionally, two individuals were selected for this year's Lifetime Achievement awards: Connecticut Center for the Book founder and 35-year employee of Hartford Public Library, Kathleen "Kat" Lyons, and Founder and President, R.J. Julia Booksellers, Roxanne J. Coady.
