HARTFORD STUDENTS GIVE VOICE TO SOCIAL JUSTICE ISSUES THROUGH ART

YWCA Hartford Region, Covenant Prep and Leadership Greater Hartford Stage "Art for Social Justice" Exhibit at Hartford Public Library

HARTFORD, Conn. – YWCA Hartford Region and Covenant Preparatory School, in partnership with Leadership Greater Hartford's 2011 QUEST class, will exhibit "Art for Social Justice" at the Hartford Public Library November 5 through 19. The exhibit showcases the work of more than 70 students from YWCA's Young Women's Leadership Corps (YWLC) and Covenant Prep's grades 5 through 8.

The "Art for Social Justice" exhibit is the culmination of a months-long project in which the students of the YWLC and Covenant Prep worked with artists from the greater Hartford area to explore issues of social justice and injustice through various art forms, including visual arts, written and spoken word, theater and movement.

"This project exemplifies YWCA's mission of eliminating racism and empowering women. We are honored to collaborate with Covenant Preparatory School and Leadership Greater Hartford on this exciting project. Both Covenant Prep and YWCA live a mission of social justice every day and share space in the same building at 135 Broad Street in Hartford. Leaders of these organizations viewed the "Art for Social Justice" project as an opportunity to unite their student groups in communicating a shared message.

"With this project, we wanted to showcase the depth of talent, spirit, and leadership of our students through their art while helping them understand important social justice issues facing the world. Through the voices of our youth, there can be wisdom about how to continually align the goals, resources and aspirations of our organizations in service to the greater good of the Hartford region," said Meara Weaver, Principal of Covenant Prep.

Jonathan Gillman, director of Looking In Theatre, facilitated a peer-led workshop with students in early October. "One of the participants said he learned that not everything is easy and that we can accomplish more together than alone. That's what art can do – it can help us look at really difficult things, find our common ground, and open the door to more truthful communication and collaboration", he said.

A community reception to celebrate the students' work will be held November 5 from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. in the atrium of the Hartford Public Library, 500 Main Street, Hartford.
