In times of change and uncertainty, it is important to remind ourselves of who we and our core values, especially inclusivity. Hartford is made up of many nationalities, colors, and cultures. Our diversity makes us strong. We are proud of our immigrant communities and the many sacrifices they have endured to make Hartford their home. And we are committed to protecting the rights of all our residents, regardless of their immigration status.

This resource guide lists services available to all Hartford residents, including undocumented immigrants. When you use city services, employees will not ask about your immigration status, unless it is necessary to do their jobs. The City of Hartford serves all residents regardless of immigration status, race, ethnicity, ancestry, national origin, age, sexual orientation, gender, marital status, physical or mental disability, or religion.

RIGHTS OF IMMIGRANTS AND REFUGEES

The City of Hartford does not conduct immigration enforcement, except in criminal investigations. Hartford police will not ask about your immigration status or communicate your information to ICE officials, unless required by law. All Hartford residents, including undocumented immigrants, have a right to be free from discrimination, retaliation, and harassment in housing, public places, and the workplace.
