

A Review of The Library's Finances


For the twelve month period ending o6/30/2014, the Hartford Public Library has expended a total of \$9,950,648.33 which represents 95% of the total budget of \$10,481,397. The Library has also collected 99% of operating revenue and 94% of revenue for grants and special events. *Note: These figures do not include the anticipated in-kind reimbursement from the Board of Education for Fiscal Year 2014.

Quarter 4 Expense Breakout (\$9,950,648.33):




Library and Public Services


Highlights include a broad spectrum of programs and services offered to adults and youth throughout the system. The "Get MoneyWise @HPL" initiative offered budgeting, credit and couponing workshops along with supporting print and media materials at all branches. Plans are underway with the Hartford Housing Authority to expand this successful series to residents in public housing. Corey Fleming is the lead on this project.


A busy spring included library on wheels promotional visits throughout the city and poster contests with special prizes to denote National Library Week. A highly successful pilot called the Kindergarten Awareness Program offered fun and informational health and safety workshops for families along with activities designed to sharpen early literacy skills for youth entering kindergarten. A collaborative effort with community stakeholders created a successful Park and Dwight branch neighborhood "Story Walk" that visibly infused books and the experience of reading and talking about a story into both communities. The storyboards were used in several subsequent celebrations and gatherings throughout the city. Leticia Cotto was the lead on this project.


The HPL/HPS collaboration team was instrumental in scheduling a series of library on wheels visits to schools in the Goodwin pilot zone. Classroom teachers brought their students outside to tour the bookmobile, where HPL staff spoke about the importance of reading over the summer, encouraged everyone to sign up to record their progress, and promoted all the programs scheduled throughout the summer. Over 700 youth and adults attended the Summer Learning Kickoff held on June 7^{th.} Parents, youth and staff an enjoyed afternoon of educational and STEMfocused programs as part of a fun day filled with, arts, entertainment and crafts. Mary Billings and Mary Tzambazakis are the leads on this project.


Library visits increased over the 4th quarter last year, resulting in stable annual attendance for FY 13/14. The benefits of expanded and upgraded public computers throughout the system are reflected by higher use for the 3rd consecutive quarter, and an annual 36% increase compared with last year. Successful library card sign-up campaigns and expanded outreach to schools are reflected in a healthy 16% increase in both adult and youth patron registration.














Adult Learners

Community-wide service and branches

June 20 World Refugee Day: Voices of Asylum Hill: Seven newly arrived residents from the Asylum Hill neighborhood shared their personal stories of struggles and triumph in their native languages with members of the receiving community by reciting their stories in English. Eighty attendees were at the event which took place at Connecticut Public Broadcasting Network.

Commitment to literacy

- The Library remains one of the few places in the region to offer ESL instruction over the summer; almost all providers of adult basic education follower their respective district's school calendar.
- Citizenship classes and volunteer tutoring for Karen residents continued on Monday evenings at the Mark Twain branch; volunteer tutors from Immanuel Church and UCONN Interns coached 20 adult students from South Marshall Street.
- This quarter our ESOL and Citizenship students participated in six field trips and other events., including tours of the State Capital, the Governor's Mansion followed by a walk through Elizabeth

- Park, and, two full day trips. One, to the 9/11 Memorial and National Museum of the American Indian, and, the other, to the Freedom Trail in Boston. Also, as part of a class project on shopping and clothing, the ESOL classes were given a tour of the Beatrice Auerbach exhibition in the Hartford History Center.
- In partnership with US Small Business Administration, we successfully launched our first series of small business workshops; 65 individuals participated.
- Youth participating in the City's Youth Employment Day came to the Library for online application support; over 50 applications were submitted.
- Adult Learning was the recipient of two Leadership Greater Hartford Encore Fellows this quarter. One, was assigned a health literacy project, and the other, Terri Fitzgerald, a GED Project. By the conclusion of her fellowship, Terri evaluated and recommended key online GED preparation tools and funding sources. She also designed a GED Ambassador Program calling on corporations to sponsor one or more GED candidates. Sponsorship could be through tutoring and/or mentoring and covering the cost of the students prep material.

Cultural Affairs and Public Programming (CAPP)

Hartford History Center (HHC)

Hartford History Center is home to the Hartford Collection, a non-circulating, multi-media collection comprised of more than 100,000 books, archival documents, directories, postcards, photographs and memorabilia that convey community life in Hartford spanning more than 300 years. Officially named in 1945, the Hartfordspecific archives and special collections of Hartford Public Library date back to the 17th century.

Hartford History Center staff answered more than 1,200 reference questions for the 4th quarter.

For online visits to our historical image collections in the 2013-2014 fiscal year: The Richard L. Mahoney Postcard Collection "Souvenirs of Hartford" had 2,892 visits; "Hartford: The Making of a City, 1900-1930," 4,058 visits; "Reflection of the Times," 2,147 visits; the Real Art Ways Collection, 25 visits; and the Elbert Weinberg Collection, 225 visits.

Sampling of reference questions in the HHC for this quarter include:

- Author Susan Campbell researching our Frog Hollow neighborhood history for a new book she is writing
- Research on Jo (Jennie, Jane) McQueeny Hollister, who was a "madam" in Hartford during the golden age
- Research on North Methodist Episcopal
- Research on Municipal Hospital, and request for a photograph to accompany a grant application for rehabbing it

- Photograph of Colt's Band from postcard collection for a grant application
- U.S. Census population figures from 1800 -1950
- Photographs and research on Burr Mall
- Photographs of demonstrations at the Federal Courthouse from the 60's and 70's for a newly appointed Federal judge
- Information about Eamon de Valera's visit to Hartford (he was the President of Ireland). He visited Hartford in 1920, 1927, 1928, 1930 and October 5, 1939.
- Information on the Foreign Born population in Hartford from the current U.S. Census
- Information on Fair Housing, for Fair Housing bus tour (Trinity College project)
- Photographs from City Parks Collection for Virtual Hartford.

HHC projects underway in the fourth quarter include processing and cataloguing the remaining 2,000 Hartford-specific postcards in the Richard L. Mahoney Collection; preparing content and images for the Hartford Through Time book – a joint effort of the Hartford History Center, Wilson "Bill" Faude and Andy Hart, to be published by Fonthill Media, that looks at Hartford streets past and present; ongoing cataloguing of the Hartford Pamphlet Collection, which dates back to 1764; the ongoing conservation of the Hartford Times photographic collection – a huge array of Hartford –specific images taken between the years 1955-1976; work on the dedicated Hartford History Center website www.hhc.hplct.org; and, continued work on the historical digital collection, specifically the glass negative collection of Hartford streets dating from the early 1900s.

Community Engagement - Center for Civic Engagement

The Center for Civic Engagement (CCE) includes several interrelated components: Hartford Matters (public programs on community issues), Hartford Votes (activities targeting increased voter engagement and voter turnout), Hartford Listens (community dialogues resulting in raised awareness, relationship building, and action), and Hartford Acts (implementation of the action recommendations from Hartford Listens). As detailed below, significant progress was made in all areas of the CCE during the 4th Quarter.

In addition, during the 4th Quarter the Library began the Libraries Transforming Communities (LTC) project. HPL is one of ten libraries in the country chosen to participate. LTC is a partnership between the American Library Association and The Harwood Institute for Public Innovation in which participants receive intensive team-based community engagement training. A team of staff from HPL attended a Public Innovators Lab in Denver in May. We will begin implementing LTC

tools at the Library and in the community during the next Quarter.

Hartford Matters

- On April 9 HPL collaborated with Hartford 2000 to present Proposed Development of Hartford-Owned Land in Farmington. Approximately 30 people attended.
- On April 15 we presented The Way We Lived: Urban Living and Lifestyle in 19th Century Hartford, attended by 25 people.
- The Resident Leadership Academy, on which HPL collaborates with Mutual Housing, held its Graduation on April 17 and drew an audience of 65 people.
- On May 12 the Library and Hartford 2000 presented Household Waste Disposal & Recycling: An Opportunity for Hartford's Neighborhoods. 46 people attended.
- We partnered with Hartford 2000 again on May 31 to offer a workshop on Asset Based Community Development attended by 30 people.

Hartford Votes

- The Library partnered with the Hartford Votes~Hartford Vota Coalition to present the film *Inequality for All*, followed by a panel discussion. 30 people attended.
- On June 18 we again collaborated with the Hartford Votes~Hartford Vota Coalition on a Republican Gubernatorial Candidate Forum. 43 people attended.

Hartford Listens

In May and June HPL collaborated with Hartford Parent University to conduct a pilot community dialogue entitled A Vision for Better Public Education in Hartford, for which HPL received a \$10,000 grant from the Nellie Mae Foundation.

Hartford Acts

Four action teams that were formed as a result of the November 2013 dialogue on


- mental health continued their work and had a joint meeting on April 23.
- The action team formed as a result of the IMLS-funded Immigrant Civic Engagement Project community dialogue continued its work to create a Hartford time bank.
- We continued work with the Welcoming Committee of the Asylum Hill NRZ to help integrate immigrants into the work of the NRZ. This is an outgrowth of the IMLS Immigrant Civic Engagement Project community dialogues.



Quarter 4, Total Estimated Attendance at Events Managed by CAPP


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

Quarterly Comparisons - July 1, 2013 - June 30, 2014





Total Development Revenue for Fourth Quarter FY14: \$434,781.85


During the final quarter of the 2014 fiscal year, a total of \$434,781.85 was received. Of this amount, \$40,597.85 was received for the Annual Fund, \$100,990.00 was received for One Big Summer Night (OBSN), \$125,000.00 was designated for YOUMedia and the remaining \$168,194.00 (much of which is grant money) was designated for all other funds, including The American Place.

Facilities

New flooring was installed in the third floor administrative area, employee lounge and hallway. The senior team was relocated in the administration area and all offices were carpeted and freshly painted.

A new circulation desk was installed at the Park Branch library.

YOUmedia contracts were executed with the contractor. The construction will continue into the 1st quarter of FY '15. The orders were finalized, requests for proposals were completed and equipment ordered.

Verizon cell tour construction began in June installing electrical conduits, and gas piping for a generator. Current work under way is steel work to shore up the roof, and prepare for tower installation. Library receives \$30,000 annually.

The Andover HVAC system and computer were upgraded for programming of the heating and cooling system. This provides the library with a standalone system, independent of the MHIS control from the City.

Downtown branch landscaping project was completed. Cost estimates were obtained for extension and installation of irrigation system. Work to be completed on irrigation by the end of 1st quarter FY'15.

Incident Reports:

The Library had thirty-four (34) reportable incidents in the fourth quarter of the fiscal year. Fourteen (14) reports were filed at the Downtown facility: three (3) intoxications, three (3) surveillance reports, two (2) thefts, two (2) rude behaviors, one

(1) violence assault, one (1) sleeping, one (1) medical, and one (1) phone threat. The Hartford Police assisted with nine incidents.

Twenty (20) reports were filed by branches:

Albany – (3) handicapped man fell and broke a chair at computers; two incidents of same customer waving what appeared to be a weapon.

Barbour – (1) siblings were being loud regarding a personal dispute.

Blue Hills – (1) male customer became disruptive when asked to put volume down on headphones.

Camp Field – (8) seven year old girl was left unattended at branch; child's bike was stolen; teen became verbally abusive; intoxicated man fell in parking lot; unknown deaf woman was found sleeping at entrance to branch; three teens were arguing; hot dog cart has been parking in front of branch, and Hartford Police reported that people were loitering outside branch until 1AM.

Dwight – (1) customer informed staff that he was being threatened by another customer.

Mark Twain – (1) female customer accused staff member of spying on her.

Park – (3) male customer passed out in bathroom; male customer walked out of branch without checking out books, and two customers were in a dispute.

Goodwin – (1) employee noticed the hub caps of his vehicle were missing.

October 2014

Ropkins – (1) school was on code red for an incident that happened over the weekend.

Security

The library's evacuation plan was updated. Active shooter training was developed by security and security guards were trained. The senior team reviewed and critiqued active shooter training for all staff. Roll out of training for all staff and branches will be completed in the fall.

Upgraded radio system for facilities staff and security quards. The upgrade allows for longer life bettery.

Human Resources

Performance management systems were reviewed in the third quarter of FY'14. Based on software capabilities, scalability and cost, Halogen software was selected. A project plan for the implementation of the performance management system was developed. As part of this project all job descriptions were reviewed and updated. Upon final sign off by the managers, the finalized job descriptions will be benchmarked to salaries and pay rates in the market. The job descriptions and compensation analysis should be completed by September.

Staff Updates

Brittany Mullen, Senior Library Assistant, assumes responsibility for the film collection. Brittany holds a Masters in Library Science and is an experienced library assistant.

Tricia George, YOUmedia Manager, assumes responsibility for the operation of YOUmedia, our new digital learning center for teens.

Promotions

Karl Fisher, has been promoted to Finance Director. Karl joined Hartford Public Library in 2012 and is responsible for oversight of all finance, accounting, reporting and procurement activities.

Leticia Cotto, has been promoted to Branch Manager and Latino Service Coordinator. This position allows her to continue with her branch management while also addressing the needs of the Latino Community system-wide.

Patricia Knapp, has been promoted to Branch Manager and School Collaboration Coordinator. This position allows her to continue with her branch management while taking the lead in the collaborative efforts with the Hartford School system.

Pramod Pradhan, has been promoted to Digital Programming Specialist. He is responsible for cultural and arts programming, as well as audiovisual support throughout the Hartford Public Library system.
