

Hartford Public Library Celebrates Annual Days of Remembrance

HARTFORD CT (April 29, 2011) — Hartford Public Library announced today that the Library will commemorate Days of Remembrance, our nation's annual commemoration of the Holocaust, with an exhibition from the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum entitled **Justice and Accountability in the Face of Genocide: What Have We Learned?** The exhibition, which will run from May 2 through May 7 will be displayed at the Downtown Library, 500 Main Street.

Matt Poland, the Library's chief executive officer, said: "We should always remember the terrible events of the Holocaust and remain vigilant against hatred, persecution, and tyranny; and as Americans we should continuously rededicate ourselves to the principles of individual freedom in a just society."
