**HARTFORD PUBLIC LIBRARY ONE OF 75 ORGANIZATIONS NATIONWIDE  
TO RECEIVE A BIG READ GRANT**

***Hartford to Read and Celebrate *The Grapes of Wrath* by John Steinbeck  
During The Big Read***



Hartford, Connecticut (June 3, 2015) —Hartford Public Library is a recipient of a grant of \$16,200 to host The Big Read in Hartford, CT. A program of the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA), The Big Read broadens our understanding of our world, our communities, and ourselves through the joy of sharing a good book. Managed by Arts Midwest, this initiative offers grants to support innovative community reading programs designed around a single book. Hartford Public Library is one of 75 nonprofit organizations to receive a grant to host a local Big Read project between September 2015 and June 2016. The Big Read in Hartford will focus on ***The Grapes of Wrath*** by John Steinbeck. Activities and programming will take place March 13 through April 30, 2016. Community partners will include organizations such as Billings Forge Community Works, The Connecticut YOUTH Forum, Goodwin College, HartBeat Ensemble, Hartford Food System, and The Connecticut State Library, Museum of Connecticut History.

NEA Chairman Jane Chu said, “The Big Read is a powerful example of how the arts can bring communities together and help us to connect with one another. These 75 organizations, including Hartford Public Library, are creating valuable opportunities for their communities to share wonderful stories and characters and to have meaningful conversations.”

“We are delighted to bring The Big Read back to Hartford with ***The Grapes of Wrath*** by John Steinbeck,” said Matthew K. Poland, the Library’s chief executive officer. “Steinbeck’s *work* evokes unique American themes of hard work, self-determination, and reasoned dissent. It speaks from assumptions common to most Americans whether, their ancestors came over in a stateroom, in steerage, or were already here to greet the migrants. It’s perfect for our City.”
