Hartford Public Library Awarded \$50,000 to Connect Heritage Collections with Civic Service

HARTFORD, CT (March 27, 2015) – The National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) announced Monday a grant in the amount of \$50,000 to Hartford Public Library in support of a collaborative project called "Find Your Voice" between the Library's Hartford History Center and the University of Connecticut's Digital Media Center to integrate cultural heritage collections with civic service.

The **Find Your Voice** project is a prototype designed to be a nationally replicable model for other libraries seeking effective ways to use interactive media to engage a diverse public in exploring historic individuals who found their civic voice through poetry, performance, and other expressive forms. The project's primary goal is to engage under-served populations by connecting the stories of past individuals who were engaged with the civic issues of their times to the work of present-day role models who have likewise found that literacy, understanding a city's shared history, and creative expression are pathways to personal and community enrichment.

"Find Your Voice is a powerful 21st-century innovation to close a widening gap between civic service in public libraries and their heritage collections," said Hartford Public Library Chief Executive Officer Matthew Poland. "Hartford Public Library continues to explore innovative approaches to making impactful change in our communities, and we are thankful to the National Endowment for the Humanities for supporting the development of this exciting new model."

Brenda J. Miller, Chief Cultural Affairs and Public Programming Officer for the Hartford Public Library, leads the team with the University of Connecticut's Tom Scheinfeldt, Ph.D., Associate Professor of Digital Media and Design and Director of Digital Humanities, and Clarissa Ceglio, Ph.D., of the Digital Media Center. The project team also includes journalist and independent historian Anne Farrow and Shana Sureck, an award-winning filmmaker and photographer.

"We and our partners at the Hartford Public Library recognize that digital technology and the humanities both play transformative roles in contemporary life," said Tim Hunter, Director of the Digital Media Center and Department Head of the School of Fine Arts' Digital Media & Design Department. "Find Your Voice focuses this transformative potential to empower individuals and communities."

"Find Your Voice" received the largest award of the six given in Connecticut. Earlier this year, this project received national funding from the Institute of Museum and Library Services.

"In the 50 years since NEH's founding, the Endowment has supported excellence in the humanities by funding far-reaching research, preservation projects and public programs," said NEH Chairman William Adams. "The grants announced today continue that tradition, making valuable humanities collections, exhibitions, documentaries, and educational resources available to communities across the country."

The award was one of 232 grants totaling \$22.8 million announced by NEH that support a variety of projects, including the development of new digital tools for study of the humanities, stipends and fellowships that support scholarly research, and the preservation of and access to historic collections. Nationally, the 2015 NEH awards include a major grant to support a 10-part documentary series by legendary filmmaker Ken Burns.

ABOUT THE HARTFORD HISTORY CENTER

The Hartford History Center (HHC) is a special collection of books, photographs, manuscripts and ephemera relating to over 300 years of community life in Connecticut's capital city. The HHC is home to the Hartford Collection, which includes works by Mark Twain, Lydia Huntley Sigourney, Noah Webster, Harriet Beecher Stowe and Wallace Stevens.
