A startling 67% of students entering Kindergarten are not adequately prepared, making learning a greater challenge as they struggle with limited resources to catch- up, according to research conducted by The Bissell Foundation.

"Our community thrives when children are given opportunities to learn and develop into successful young men and women," said I. Bradley Hoffman, Co-Chairman, Hoffman Auto Group. Hoffman continued, "It is important for local businesses to join together and help establish the infrastructure supporting families in the community."

The good news is for every dollar spent on students the research shows a reduction of seven dollars required for remediation. Sadly, remediation usually does not occur until the first year in college so it is vital to provide early intervention programs. "It is important to do equitable things and have services for everyone," stated Matthew Poland, Chief Executive Officer, Hartford Public Library. He continued, "Everyone should have a chance for their children to enter school and be well prepared."

Jeffrey S. Hoffman, Co-Chairman, Hoffman Auto Group, agreed "The city of Hartford is growing and boasts a competitive employment environment but we must not forget to boost the educational opportunities for our young people as well."
