



MK Asante Speaks Oct. 25 As Part of Hip Hop Nation at Hartford Public Library

Oct. 12, 2016 — MK Asante, author of Buck: A Memoir speaks about his early years on Tuesday, Oct. 25, 5:30 to 7:30 pm, in the Center for Contemporary Culture at Hartford Public Library, 500 Main St. The event is part of the Hip Hop

Nation programming.



The bestseller recalls Asante's youth in Philadelphia, which he refers to as Killadelphia, Pistolvania. His older brother is arrested, Asante hates school, and his father is absent. But he learns to write, inspired by hip hop artists Tupac Shakur and Public Enemy.

Asante studied at the University of London, earned a B.A. from Lafayette College, and an M.F.A. from the UCLA School of Theater, Film, and Television.

Asante is a Distinguished Professor-in-Residence at the MICA School of Ideas in India, and and a tenured professor of

creative writing and film at Morgan State University.

He also wrote It's Bigger Than Hip Hop, and two volumes of poetry, Like Water Running Off My Back, and Beautiful. And Ugly Too.

A graffiti mural project, run by Hartford artist Lindaluz Carrillo, is being create din YOUmedia and the painted panels will displayed in Hartford History Center Nov. 1 through Dec. 2. The new work will be shown with archival images from the 1981 and 1991 Hip Hop Nation exhibitions at Real Art Ways.

On Nov. 3, 6 to 7:30 pm, in the Hartford History Center, a conversation about Hartford Hip Hop history features Empress Nijuabi, a Hartford-based rapper who was part of the Real Art Ways 1991 Hip Hop Nation exhibition, and Seth Markle, associate professor of history and international studies at Trinity College, who is faculty advisor to the annual Trinity International Hip Hop Festival.

A Downtown Dance Battle, hosted by Zulu Nation 860, will feature a Bboy/girl breakdancing dance off and all styles battle in the Atrium of the Downtown Library on Saturday, Nov. 5, 11 am to 4 pm.
