**Tuesday, March 1, 6-7:30 pm**, Hartford History Center, 3<sup>rd</sup> Floor, Free: **The Life & Song of Nina Simone: A Tertulia**. Conversation led by Gail H. Woldu, professor of music at Trinity College, with performance by singer Margaux Hayes. One of a series of tertulias, a social gathering with literary overtones.

**Friday, March 4, noon to 1 pm**, Atrium, Free.: **Preview of Women Composers Festival of Hartford**. A short concert features highlights of the upcoming 16<sup>th</sup> annual festival (March 10-13), featuring the work of composer-in-residence Jessica Meyer and keynote speaker Liane Curtis. **Thursday, March 10, 1 to 2:30 pm**, Hartford History Center, 3<sup>rd</sup> Floor, Free: **Hartford Women Changemakers: Tea with Ann Uccello**. In 1967, Antonina "Ann" Uccello became the Mayor of Hartford, the first woman in the United States to head a capital city, during a period when most women were excluded from powerful positions. Students from Hartford's Grace Academy school will be there to ask questions. Marie Gionfrido Hamilton, a former assistant registrar of voters for Hartford, will moderate. Paul Pirrotta, author of *Hartford "Mayor Ann Uccello: A Connecticut Trailblazer"* (2015) will be selling and signing books, and light refreshments will be served.

**Saturday, March 26, 10:15 am 12:15 pm, Poets on Poetry**, Hartford History Center 3<sup>rd</sup> floor. The poems of Heather McHugh will be discussed. Moderator Clare Rossini, artist-in-residence at Trinity College, also a poet. McHugh is a MacArthur and Guggenheim fellow, and recipient of the PEN/Voelcker Award for Poetry. She is appearing June 22 at the Sunken Garden Poetry Festival at the Hill-Stead Museum in Farmington. Rossini will read at Sunken Garden on July 20.

**Tuesday, March 22, 6-8 pm**, Hartford History Center, Free: **Sisters Are Doing It. Celebrating Women Executives and Entrepreneurs in Hartford**. This event celebrates historic women and women who are currently leaders in non-profit and for-profit organizations within Hartford. Panelists include: Patricia Kelley from *Ebony Horsewomen*; Ana Valentine from *Cultura Mosaica*; and Cindy Wolfe Boynton, author of *"Remarkable Hartford Women."*

**Wednesday, March 30**, 6 to 7 pm, Center for Contemporary Culture, Free: **Women in Media.**

Columnist, Teacher and Author Susan Campbell will moderate a free-ranging discussion of women who are reporting, editing and broadcasting, in news venues in Hartford.
